COUNTDOWN TO SPORTS AUTHORITY MW CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

Air Force and San Diego State will play in the 2015 Sports Authority Mountain West Football Championship Game on Saturday, December 5. Kickoff is scheduled for 5:30 p.m. MT/4:30 p.m. PT/2:30 p.m. HT and will be televised on ESPN2.

Air Force clinched the Mountain Division crown by virtue of its 37-30 victory at Boise State last Friday, combined with Colorado State's 28-21 win over New Mexico in Albuquerque on Saturday. The Falcons are currently 6-1 in MW play (8-3 overall) and have a two-game lead over Boise State and New Mexico with one contest remaining in the regular season. Air Force is seeking its first Mountain West football title and fourth overall league crown. The last time the Falcons won a conference football championship was in 1998 when they defeated BYU 20-13.

San Diego State secured the West Division after Utah State's 31-27 victory over Nevada last Saturday. The Aztecs are 7-0 in MW play (8-3 overall) and currently have a three-game lead in the division with one contest remaining. SDSU is in search of its first outright Mountain West football championship. It would also be the Aztecs first outright football title overall since 1986.

Air Force and San Diego State did not meet this season. The Falcons hold a 19-14 series advantage over the Aztecs, including an 11-6 record at home. SDUS holds the advantage in San Diego, 8-7 and is currently riding a 5-game win streak in the series with Air Force.

The 2015 Sports Authority Mountain West Football Championship will be played at the home stadium of the higher-ranked divisional champion according to the selected computer polls, which will be determined on Sunday, Nov. 29.

BOWL ELIGIBILITY

Air Force (8-3), Boise State (7-4), San Diego State (8-3), Colorado State (6-5), Nevada (6-5), New Mexico (6-5) and Utah State (6-5) are all bowl eligible this season.

The Falcons have qualified for the postseason in eight of the last nine years, while the Broncos have played in a bowl game in each of the last 13 seasons. The Aztecs are bowl eligible for the sixth straight year, while the Rams qualify for the postseason for the third consecutive year. Wolf Pack are eligible for a bowl for the 10th time in the last 11 seasons and the Aggies have earned bowl-eligibility for a program record fifth straight time. The Lobos have reached the six win mark for the first time since 2007.

Air Force, Boise State, Colorado State, Nevada, New Mexico, San Diego State and Utah State are seven of the 71 teams in the FBS to have qualified for postseason in 2015.

2015 marks the eighth straight year the MW has sent at least five teams to bowls and 11th time since the league's inception in 1999. It also marked the fourth straight season that six or more MW squads advanced to the postseason. In all three years since the Mountain West went to 12 teams and two divisions, it has had seven bowl-eligible teams to set a MW record.

The Mountain West posted a 3-4 bowl record (.429) in 2014. Overall, the Mountain West has earned 69 bowl bids since 1999 and holds a 38-31 (.551) all-time record. The league has also posted an overall postseason mark of at least .500 in eight of the last 11 seasons.

Over the last 11 seasons, the Mountain West has captured the Bowl Challenge Cup four times and owns the second-best win percentage in bowl games among the 10 FBS conferences with a 31-23 mark (.574) during that span. The MW is the only conference to win the trophy four times since the award's inception in 2002-03.

NO FLY ZONE

The Boise State starting secondary has recorded more career interceptions than any other starting secondary in the nation. Made up of **Darian Thompson**, **Donte Deayon**, **Jonathan Moxey** and **Dylan Sumner-Gardner**, the Broncos have 40 career picks. Thompson has 19 career interceptions, the most among FBS defenders and most by a MW defender all-time, while Deayon has 17 career INTs, which is tied for the third-most in Mountain West history and tied for second-most among active NCAA defenders. Moxey has the other four interceptions for Boise State.

TWO NEW HEAD COACHES JOIN MW RANKS IN 2015

For the second consecutive year, the Mountain West welcomes two new head football coaches. Colorado State will be under the direction of **Mike Bobo**, while **Tony Sanchez** takes over at UNLV. Both are first-year head coaches.

Bobo comes to Colorado State from the University of Georgia, where he had spent the previous 14 seasons, including the last eight as offensive coordinator. Bobo's 14-year stint at Georgia, where he was a quarterback in the late 1990s, began in January, 2001, when head coach Mark Richt hired him as quarterbacks coach. He was promoted to offensive coordinator in 2007. During his time at UGA, Bobo helped lead the Bulldogs to 135 victories, including two Southeastern Conference championships, five SEC Eastern Division titles and eight bowl victories. Prior to his time with the Bulldogs, Bobo began his coaching career at Jacksonville State (1999-2000).

Sanchez spent the last six seasons leading Bishop Gorman (Las Vegas) High School on an overall record of 85-5 and six consecutive state 4A championships. In his six seasons at Bishop Gorman, Sanchez saw 34 of his players earn collegiate football scholarships, including 25 to FBS programs. Prior to his stint in Las Vegas, he coached at Ocate High School in Las Cruces, N.M. and Irvin High School in El Paso, Texas. His lone collegiate coaching experience came in 1996 as he was an undergraduate assistant at New Mexico State, the school where Sanchez was a two-year letterwinner.

FIRST-YEAR HEAD COACHES IN THE MOUNTAIN WEST

The Mountain West has welcomed 24 new head coaches over the last 16 seasons. Former BYU head coach Gary Crowton and current Boise State head coach **Bryan Harsin** have posted the most victories and highest win percentage among the group with 12 victories and an .857 win percentage in their inaugural years in 2001 and 2014, respectively. Harsin became the first to conclude his inaugural season by winning the Mountain West Championship Game, the first of two outright MW Championships in program history. Harsin is the only alumnus to lead the Broncos as head coach in the history of Boise State. Harsin is one of three first-year coaches to win at least 10 games in their inaugural season, joining Crowton (12 wins, 2001) and Urban Meyer (10 wins, 2003).

MOUNTAIN WEST IN THE POSTSEASON

The Mountain West sent a record seven teams into postseason bowl games in 2014, posting a 3-4 record (.429). Overall, the Mountain West has earned 69 bowl bids since 1999 and holds a 38-31 (.551) all-time record. The league has also posted an overall postseason mark of at least .500 in eight of the last 11 seasons.

The 2014 postseason marked the eighth straight year the MW has sent at least five teams to bowls and 11th time since the league's inception in 1999. It also marked the second straight year that six or more MW squads advanced to the postseason.

WEEK 1 OFFENSIVE

Nick Stevens, QB, Colorado State

- In his first career start, completed 20-of-28 passes (71.4 percent) for 289 yards and five touchdown passes (all career highs) in Colorado State's 65-13 victory over Savannah State.
- His five touchdown passes went to five different receivers.
- The five touchdown passes tied for the second-most in CSU history, and the most by a Rams quarterback making his debut start. Played in only two and a half quarters due to the score.

DEFENSIVE

Calvin Munson, LB, San Diego State

- Recorded a team-high 11 tackles (3 solo), two interceptions (both returned for a touchdown - 19 yards and 67 yards) and 2.5 tackles for loss in San Diego State's 37-3 win over San Diego.
- Became the first player in school history and fourth since the inception of the Mountain West in 1999 to have two interceptions returned for a touchdown in a single game (SDSU has been playing football since 1921).
- The two interceptions returned for a touchdown ties an NCAA single-game record for a linebacker and are tied for the second most among all players.
- The two interceptions were more than every player in the country in Week 1 except for teammate Damontae Kazee and West Virginia's Karl Joseph (both had three).
- The fumble recovery was the first of his career.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Andrew Rodriguez, WR/PR, Utah State

- Returned eight punts for 136 yards in Utah State's season-opening 12-9 win against Southern Utah.
- His 88-yard punt return for a touchdown in the fourth quarter proved to be the game-winning score. Overall, he returned a USU and MW record eight punts for 136 yards against SUU.
- Rodriguez's 88-yard punt return is tied for the second-longest in Mountain West history.
- The 88-yard punt return for also is a Maverik Stadium record and the third-longest in Aggie history trailing Kevin Robinson, who returned a punt 90 yards for a touchdown at Troy in 2004, and Dale Leatham, who also returned a punt 90 yards for a touchdown at Wichita State in 1950. Robinson held the previous Maverik Stadium record with an 87-yard punt return for a touchdown against San José State in 2005.
- The previous MW record was also seven by Scott Harding (Hawai'i) in 2014.

WEEK 2 OFFENSIVE

D.J. Johnson, RB, Air Force

- Rushed for 103 yards for his first-career 100-yard game on a career-most 21 carries in Air Force's 36-17 victory over Mountain West foe San José State.
- Tied his career-high with three rushing touchdowns all of which came in the fourth quarter.
- Scored on a 13-yard run to put the Falcons ahead 23-16 with 12:29 left in the game and followed with a one-yard run on fourth-and-goal to give the Falcons a two-score lead.
- Clinched the game with his final touchdown on a career-long 34 yard run with 3:43 left in the game.
- Six carries went for touchdowns or first downs, including five in the fourth quarter.
- Had 12 carries for 82 yards and three touchdowns in the fourth quarter.

DEFENSIVE

Weston Steelhammer, DB, Air Force

- Recorded six total tackles and led the defensive effort of holding San José State to just 16 points in the Air Force victory over the Spartans.
- Had one quarterback sack and a career-high three tackles for loss for 12 yards.
- Registered an interception in the fourth quarter to seal the game with the Falcons up by two scores.
- His three tackles for loss are the most by an Air Force player this season and gives him 4.5 TFL for the year.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Wyatt Bryan, K, Colorado State

- In Colorado State's 23-20 overtime loss to Minnesota, connected on a 37-yard, game-tying field goal as regulation expired, sending the game into overtime.
- Trailing 13-7, hit a 26-yard field goal late in the third-quarter, part of a 10-point swing that gave the Rams' the lead until the final minute of the game.
- Made two extra-point kicks.

WEEK 3 OFFENSIVE

Jeremy McNichols, RB, Boise State

- Scored three rushing touchdowns in Boise State's 52-0 victory over Idaho State.
- Ran for 69 yards on 15 carries.

DEFENSIVE

Jerrold Garcia-Williams, LB, Hawai'i

- Recorded a career-high 15 total tackles, including 12 solo, in Hawai'i's 47-27 victory over UC Davis.
- His 15 tackles are the most in a game by a UH defender since Corey Paredes vs. New Mexico State on Nov. 22, 2010.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Tanner Vallejo, LB, Boise State

- Played a key role in preserving Boise State's first shutout since 2011.
- Blocked one punt and field goal in Boise State's 52-0 win against Idaho State.
- His blocks came on consecutive drives, as he blocked and then recovered a Bengal punt inside the 30-yard line at the beginning of the second half. On the next Idaho State possession, blocked a 36-yard field-goal attempt to keep the Bengals scoreless.

WEEK 4 OFFENSIVE

Tyler Ervin, RB, San José State

- Rushed for a San José State single-game record 300 yards on 42 carries and three touchdowns in the Spartans 49-23 victory against Fresno State.
- Also had four receptions for 45 yards and totaled 345 all-purpose yards in the contest.
- The 300 rushing yards and 345 all-purpose yards are the most by a FBS player this season.
- Outgained the Fresno State team by himself, 345 all-purpose yards to Fresno State's 247 yards of total offense.
- The 300 rushing yards are the most by a senior in a single game in Mountain West history, and are the third-most overall in league history.

DEFENSIVE

Dameon Baber, DB, Nevada

- In his first collegiate game, recorded 10 tackles (3 solo) and two interceptions as Nevada won on the road at Buffalo 24-21.
- Picked off a pass in the end zone in the third quarter to thwart a Buffalo scoring opportunity and keep the Wolf Pack in the lead 17-13.
- With under two minutes remaining in the game and Nevada leading by just three points (24-21), Buffalo was once again driving into Wolf Pack territory. On 4th-and-15 from Nevada's 47-yard line, Baber tallied the game-clinching interception.
- First Wolf Pack player to record multiple interceptions since Markus Smith against Hawai'i on Sept. 21, 2013.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Rashaad Penny, RB/KR, San Diego State

- Returned two kicks for a career-high 137 yards in San Diego State's 37-21 loss at Penn State.
- Averaging 68.5 yards per return and finished with a career-high 192 all-purpose yards on just three touches.
- His 100-yard kickoff return for a touchdown in the second quarter tied the game a seven.
- The kick return TD was his second this year, matching Colin Lockett (2012) for the most in a single-season in SDSU history.
- Recorded one rush for a career-long 55 yards. It was also the longest run against a Penn State since Nov. 23, 2013.
- Also added two solo tackles on special teams.

WEEK 5 OFFENSIVE

Kent Myers, QB, Utah State

- Rushed for a career-best 191 yards on a career-high 16 carries in Utah State's 33-18 Mountain West win over Colorado State.
- Completed 12-of-21 passes for 137 yards, one touchdown and no interceptions.
- Set a new Aggies record for most rushing yards by a quarterback.
- His 191 rushing yards are the most by a Football Bowl Subdivision quarterback this year.
- Recorded four rushes of 25 or more yards (34, 34, 27, 26).

DEFENSIVE

Ryan McAleenan, LB, UNLV

- Registered six tackles, a shared sack and an interception returned for a touchdown in UNLV's 23-17 victory over rival Nevada.
- Recorded a shared sack with teammate Tory McTyler in the third quarter for the Rebels' only quarterback takedown of the game.
- With UNLV leading 13-10 in the fourth quarter, McAleenan intercepted a pass and returned it 52 yards for a touchdown.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Logan Yunker, P, UNLV

- Recorded eight punts for an average of 42.9 yards in UNLV's 23-17 win at rival Nevada.
- Pinned the Wolf Pack inside the 10-yard line on four different occasions.
- Registered three punts of 50-plus yards, including a long of 59 yards in the fourth quarter.



WEEK 6 OFFENSIVE

Donnel Pumphrey, RB, San Diego State

- Had a career-high 30 rushes for 148 yards (4.9 avg.), including three touchdowns in San Diego State's 28-14 win at Hawai'i. Also had two catches for 49 yards.
- His first two rushing touchdowns of 34 and 8 yards put the Aztecs up 14-0 just 5:50 into the game.
- His final touchdown of the game came on a 4-yard run at the beginning of the fourth quarter and extended SDSU's lead to 28-14.
- Had a career-long 36-yard reception, which came on a 3rd and 6 and led to his final touchdown.

DEFENSIVE

Brodie Hicks, DB, Air Force

- Recorded eight total tackles (five solo), one fumble recovery and a career-high two interceptions in Air Force's 31-17 victory over Wyoming.
- With a little more than a minute remaining in the third quarter and Wyoming at the Falcon five-yard line, Hicks recovered a Wyoming fumble to stop the drive and keep Air Force up 14-3.
- His solo and assisted tackle totals were both career highs, while the two interceptions and fumble recovery were the first of his career.
- Became the first Falcon since Weston Steelhammer in 2014 vs. Boise State to record three turnovers in a game, and just the third Air Force player in the last five years to accomplish the feat.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Austin Lopez, K, San José State

- Was a perfect 2-for-2 on field goal attempts and 3-for-3 on PATs as San José State halted a seven-game road losing streak with a 33-27 overtime victory at UNLV.
- Came into the game 1-for-3 on the season in field goals and made attempts of 30 and 34 yards. The 30-yard field goal gave San José State its first score of the game after trailing, 10-0. His second field goal with 6:22 left in the third quarter.
- Recorded five touchbacks on six kickoffs.

WEEK 7 OFFENSIVE

Cameron Coffman, QB, Wyoming

- Completed 18-of-20 passes (90.0 percent) for 213 yards and three touchdowns in Wyoming's 28-21 victory over Nevada. Also rushed for 32 yards for 245 yards of total offense.
- His passer rating of 228.96 versus the Wolf Pack is an MW single-game high in 2015.
- Guided the Cowboys on an eight-play, 76-yard drive to start the second half that increased the Wyoming lead to 28-7.
- Led Wyoming on three long scoring drives of 65, 75 and 76 yards, plus adding a fourth scoring drive of 47 yards.

DEFENSIVE

Kyler Fackrell, LB, Utah State

- Recorded a season-high 11 stops (four solo), including 2.5 tackles for loss, in Utah State's 52-26 win against then-No. 21 Boise State.
- Recovered two fumbles as part of eight takeaways by Utah State. He also forced a fumble and had two quarterback hurries. The Aggies scored 35 first-half points off of Boise State turnovers.
- Helped anchor a Utah State defense that limited the Broncos to just 34 yards rushing as the Aggies had 10.0 tackles for loss and 4.0 sacks.
- His first fumble recovery led to a late first-quarter touchdown that gave the Aggies a 17-3 lead. With less than two minutes remaining in the first half, Fackrell forced a fumble that was recovered by Utah State. The Aggies scored one play later to increase their lead to 38-10.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Carlos Wiggins, KR, New Mexico

- Recorded a 100-yard kickoff return for a touchdown in New Mexico's 28-27 victory over Hawai'i.
- He is the first player in MW history with three 100-yard KOR TDs.
- Caught three passes for 29 yards, including a 12-yard pass on 3rd-and-10 on the final game-winning drive.

WEEK 8 OFFENSIVE

Karson Roberts, QB, Air Force

- Rushed for a season-high 92 yards on 18 carries (5.1 yards per carry) and scored a career-high four rushing touchdowns in Air Force's 42-14 victory over Fresno State.
- Completed 5-of-10 passes for 108 yards and caught the first pass of his career (20 yards) to score his first-career receiving touchdown.
- Became the first Falcon to rush for four touchdowns in a single game since fullback Mike DeWitt vs. New Mexico in 2011. Also is the first Air Force quarterback to rush for four touchdowns since Shaun Carney vs. UNLV on Oct. 15, 2005. The four rushing touchdowns tie as the third-most ever in a game by a quarterback.
- His 30 points scored in the game are the second-most in school history and most since Dee Dowis set the school record of 36 vs. San Diego State Sept. 2, 1989.

DEFENSIVE

Ian Seau, DE, Nevada

- Recorded four solo tackles, all sacks, in Nevada's 30-20 win over Hawai'i. The four sacks are a career-high and were a half sack shy of the Wolf Pack single-game record of 4.5 sacks by Jorge Cordova against Washington on Oct. 11, 2003.
- Became the ninth player in Mountain West history to register four sacks in a single game. It also marked the most sacks by an MW player since Wyoming's Korey Jones had four against Texas State on Sept. 10, 2011.
- The 4.0 sacks against the Rainbow Warriors tie for the most in a single game in the FBS this season (with Texas A&M's Daeshon Hall and East Carolina's Montese Overton).
- With under two minutes remaining and Hawai'i at the Nevada 22-yard line, Seau tallied his fourth sack of the game, while also stripping the ball from Rainbow Warrior quarterback Max Wittek and recovering the fumble.
- Helped the Nevada defense limit Hawai'i to just 34 yards rushing, the fewest rushing yards allowed by the Wolf Pack since limiting San José State to 30 rushing yards on Nov. 8, 2009.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Brent Zuzo, PK, Nevada

- Was a perfect 3-for-3 on field goal attempts (40, 29 and 30 yards), 3-for-3 on PATs, and converted an on-sides kick in Nevada's 30-20 come-from-behind victory over Hawai'i.
- His three made field goals matched a career-high as did his 12 total points in the contest.
- With 1:12 remaining in the second half, recovered his own onside kick. The play helped shift the momentum of the game and set up his own 40-yard field goal, which made it a one-score game entering halftime.
- Converted a 30-yard field goal with 9:01 remaining in the fourth quarter to put Nevada in front 23-20.

WEEK 9 OFFENSIVE

Donnel Pumphrey, RB, San Diego State

- Rushed 20 times for 121 yards (6.1 avg.) and two touchdowns, while adding two catches for 47 yards (23.5 avg.) and another score, as San Diego State defeated Colorado State 41-17 in Fort Collins.
- The first rushing touchdown was from 1-yard out and gave SDSU a 7-0 lead on San Diego State's opening drive. His second score was a 32-yard receiving TD that put the Aztecs up 20-10 early in the third quarter. His final was a 64-yard run in the fourth quarter to give SDSU a 34-17 advantage just two plays after CSU had cut the lead back to 10.
- Had a game-high 168 all-purpose yards.
- The three overall touchdowns matched a season high.

DEFENSIVE

Damontae Kazee, DB, San Diego State

- Finished with seven tackles (five solo), an interception for a touchdown and a forced fumble in San Diego State's 41-17 win at Colorado State.
- The forced fumble came on CSU's opening drive in the end zone, keeping the Rams off the scoreboard (SDSU led, 7-0) and giving the Aztecs the ball back at their own 20-yard line.
- The 55-yard interception returned for a touchdown was the first of his career and put SDSU up 27-10 with 3:34 left in the third quarter.
- The seven tackles tied for the second-most on the team, while the five solo stops tied for the team lead.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Donny Hageman, PK, San Diego State

- Was 2-for-2 in field goal attempts and 5-for-5 in PAT's as SDSU defeated Colorado State on the road 41-17.
- Had back-to-back field goals late in the second quarter to tie the game at 10-10 (20 yards) and with no time left to give SDSU a 13-10 lead (54 yards).
- The 54-yard field goal matched his career long and was the second-longest in program history.
- Finished with 11 of the team's 41 points.
- Also was perfect in kickoff attempts, averaging 65.0 yards per boot on seven attempts with a career-high-tying five touchbacks.

WEEK 10 OFFENSIVE

James Butler, RB, Nevada

- Rushed for 122 yards on 18 carries and scored one touchdown in Nevada's 30-16 road victory at Fresno State.
- Posted 116 of his 122 total rushing yards in the second half for his fifth 100-yard rushing game of the season.
- Had 84 rushing yards in the fourth quarter, helping the Wolf Pack collect 185 total yards on the ground in the fourth period.
- Broke free for a 59-yard touchdown run at the 11:17 mark of the fourth quarter to extend Nevada's lead to 30-16.

DEFENSIVE

Dameon Baber, DB, Nevada

- Record one solo tackle and intercepted three passes in the fourth quarter of Nevada's 30-16 win at Fresno State.
- His three interceptions matched a Mountain West record as he became the ninth player in league history, and second this season, to tally three picks in a single game.
- His interceptions were the second-most in Wolf Pack history and the most since Sept. 28, 1974 when Greg Grouwinkel collected four picks against Portland State.
- Is one of seven players in FBS this season with three interceptions in a single game.
- The three interceptions helped Nevada shutout Fresno State in the second half, marking the Pack's first second half shutout since Nov. 1, 2014 against San Diego State. Baber helped Nevada post a 13-0 scoring advantage and a 335-73 advantage in total yards in the second half.
- Intercepted passes at Nevada's own 27, 1 and 11-yard line to that help keep Fresno State off the scoreboard.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Brent Zuzo, K, Nevada

- Was 3-of-3 on field goal attempts and connected on all three extra points as Nevada won at Fresno State 30-16.
- Matched his career-high in made field goals (3) and total points (12) in a single game.
- Hit a career-long 47-yard field goal with 2:57 remaining in the first half to put the Wolf Pack in front 17-10.
- Gave Nevada a 20-16 lead with a 30-yard field goal at 8:28 in the third quarter and a 23-16 lead with a 25-yard field goal at 00:42 in the third quarter.

WEEK 11 OFFENSIVE

Thomas Sperbeck, WR, Boise State

- Set the Boise State and Mountain West single-game record with 20 receptions, and established the school record with 281 receiving yards in Boise State's 31-24 loss to New Mexico.
- The 20 catches and 281 receiving yards also stand as the most by an FBS player in 2015.
- The 281 receiving yards are the third-highest single-game total in Mountain West history.

DEFENSIVE

Ryan Langford, LB, New Mexico

- Recorded a season-high eight tackles (three solo), including a half sack, a fumble recovery and an interception in New Mexico's 31-24 win at Boise State. Both of his takeaways occurred inside the Lobo 5-yard line and halted Bronco scoring drives.
- His first takeaway was an interception on Boise State's opening drive of the game when he picked off quarterback Brett Rypien at the 3-yard line. It marked the first time the Broncos had a turnover in the red zone in their last 99 drives.
- With the Lobos up 14-3 in the second quarter, he recovered a fumble at the Lobo 1-yard line to end another potential scoring threat.
- His half-sack came with under five minutes to go in the fourth quarter on a drive that ended up being UNM's fourth red zone stop of the day.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Zack Rogers, K/P, New Mexico

- Punted eight times for a 42.1 average, connected on a 32-yard field goal and was 4-for-4 on extra points in New Mexico's 31-24 victory over Boise State.
- With just over six minutes remaining in the fourth quarter and the Lobos' up 31-17, he saved a safety when he leaped for a high snap at the goal line and tipped it enough to slow it down. Rogers then caught the ball in the end zone, rolled to his right and punted the ball between two on-rushing Broncos for a 41-yard punt to the Boise State 44 yard line. BSU would not score on the next drive.
- His final punt pinned Boise State at its own 10-yard line with 1:17 left in the game.

WEEK 12 OFFENSIVE

Karson Roberts, QB, Air Force

- Hit 9-16 passes for a career-high 279 yards and tied his career high with two touchdown passes in Air Force's 37-30 road victory at Boise State. He also rushed for 66 yards and a touchdown on 16 carries.
- The nine completions and 16 passing attempts are second-most in his career.
- Three of his completions were over 50 yards, and he averaged 31 yards per completion.
- His one-yard touchdown run at the beginning of the second quarter cut the Boise State lead to three points, 13-10.
- The 67-yard touchdown pass to Jalen Robinette midway through the second quarter gave the Falcons a 17-13 lead and completed a comeback that saw the Falcons trail 10-0 just 1:20 into the game.

DEFENSIVE

Kyler Fackrell, LB, Utah State

- Recorded 10 tackles (3 solo), including 0.5 tackles for loss, two quarterback hurries and a fumble recovery in the end zone for a touchdown as Utah State rallied from 20 points down to capture a 31-27 victory over Nevada.
- With 6:55 remaining in the fourth quarter, he recovered a fumble in the end zone for a touchdown, which tied the game at 27. The Aggies then kicked the ensuing extra point to take the lead for good.
- The fumble recovery by Fackrell was his fifth of the season, which leads the nation.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Luke Strebel, K, Air Force

- Was perfect on the day, hitting all four extra point attempts and a career-high three field goals in Air Force's 37-30 victory at Boise State.
- Connected on field goals from 18, 32 and 45 yards. The 45-yard field goal is the second-longest of his career and sealed the game for Air Force, as the kick extended its lead to two possessions with 2:11 remaining.

WHAT TO WATCH FOR

- Boise State has lost back-to-back games in the same season for the first time since 2007. That year, the Broncos were defeated on Nov. 23 by Hawai'i (39-27) and on Dec. 23 by East Carolina in the Sheraton Hawai'i Bowl (41-38).
- Broncos QB **Brett Rypien** set the Mountain West record for most passing yards in a single season by a freshman. In nine games, Rypien has thrown for 2,776 yards and 15 touchdowns. Colorado State's Pete Thomas previously held the record, throwing for 2,662 yards in 2010. Rypien averages 308.8 passing yards per contest, which is the most by a Mountain West QB and the most by a freshman QB nationally.
- The Spartans lead the nation in fewest passing yards allowed per game (149.6). Over the last 23 games, SJSU is allowing just 126.8 passing yards per contest. It has been ranked in the top 5 nationally in this category every week since Sept. 20, 2014.
- Boise State WR **Thomas Sperbeck** has caught 76 passes for 1,289 yards and eight touchdowns. He now holds the program record for single-season receiving yardage, surpassing Titus Young's 1,215 in 2010. Sperbeck is 12 receptions away from tying the school record for single-season catches, which was set by Matt Miller in 2013 (88). Nationally, Sperbeck ranks fourth in receiving yardage (1,289) and receiving yards per game (117.2).
- On Nov. 14 at New Mexico, Sperbeck hauled in 20 receptions for 281 yards. No FBS player caught more than 20 balls in a single game since Oct. 13, 2012 when Louisiana Tech's Quinton Patton caught 21 passes vs. Texas A&M. The 281 receiving yards are the most since Oct. 19, 2013 when Michigan's Jeremy Gallon had 369 yards and Texas A&M's Mike Evans had 287 yards.
- Boise State's **Jeremy McNichols** is one of eight running backs nationally with at least 16 rushing touchdowns this season. Overall, McNichols is averaging 12.0 points per game to rank third in the FBS for scoring.
- McNichols has scored a touchdown in 10 consecutive games, which is a Mountain West record. Overall, he has 20 TDs which is third-most in the FBS this season.
- San José State has 23 rushing touchdowns this year, eclipsing the team's total of 11 in 2014 and 12 in 2013. The last time the Spartans scored 20 or more rushing touchdowns in a season was in 2004 when they had 22.
- Spartans RB **Tyler Ervin** ranks eighth nationally with 1,417 rushing yards. Deoncé Whitaker (2000) holds the program record for rushing yards in a single season with 1,577. Ervin needs to rush for 161 rushing yards in the Spartans final game to set the program record.
- On the year, Ervin has scored 15 total touchdowns, including 13 on the ground, which is tied for the most by a Spartan since at least 2001 (Chandler Jones - 15 TDs in 2013). The program single-season touchdown record is held by Johnny Johnson, Jr., who scored 19 times in 1988.
- When it comes to all-purpose yardage, Ervin ranks second nationally, averaging 206.7 yards per contest. On the season, he has rushed for 1,417 yards, hauled in 307 receiving yards, and has 550 return yards. In his career, Ervin has 5,783 all-purpose yards, which leads all active FBS players. He now owns the program record for career all-purpose yards.

WHAT TO WATCH FOR

- Cowboys RB **Brian Hill** ranks ninth nationally with 1,399 rushing yards. Former Wyoming RB Ryan Christopherson holds the school record with 1,455 rushing yards (1994). Hill needs 57 rushing yards in the Cowboys final game to establish a new program record.
- Hill has three 200-yard games this season, which is tied for the most in a single-season by a MW player.
- Wyoming DE **Eddie Yarbrough** has racked up 37 career tackles for loss, which is the most TFLs by a Cowboys defender all-time.
- Cowboys DB **Andrew Wingard** has racked up 113 tackles this season, becoming the first Wyoming defender to record more than 100 tackles in a single season since 2013. Wingard is one of 14 FBS defenders with at least 100 stops and his 113 total tackles rank 10th nationally.
- After a 4-8 record in 2014 and a 1-10 mark this season, Wyoming head coach **Craig Bohl** will have back-to-back losing seasons for the first time in his 14-year career.
- Cowboys QB **Cameron Coffman** has tossed 15 touchdowns in eight games this season, tied for the second-most by a MW QB. CSU's **Nick Stevens** leads with 20 TD passes.
- Last Saturday vs. San Diego State, a UNLV RB lost a fumble for the first time in 652 carries. The last lost fumble was on Nov. 21, 2013 at Air Force.
- The Rebels have lost four fumbles this season, which is sixth-best among all FBS teams.
- The Rebels defense has intercepted 12 passes in 2015. The 12 picks, which have been recorded by nine different players, are five more than UNLV registered last season and as many as the 2013 Rebel squad had in 13 games.
- The UNLV defense has scored three touchdowns this season, which is the most in the Mountain West and 14th-best nationally.
- UNLV has three victories on the season for only the fourth time in the last 12 seasons. The last time the Rebels won four games was in 2013 (7).

WHAT TO WATCH FOR

- Utah State earned bowl eligibility for a program-best fifth straight season with last Saturday's victory over Nevada. A win over BYU would give the Aggies their fifth straight season with at least seven wins.
- Utah State is riding a 14-game home win streak, the third-best streak nationally. Florida State (21) and Clemson (16) are the only teams with longer home win streaks. The Aggies haven't lost at home since Oct. 12, 2013 vs. Boise State (34-23). Overall, Utah State has won 23-of-25 home games.
- When it produces a 100-yard rusher, Utah State has won 20 consecutive games. Last Saturday, **Devante Mays** rushed for 133 yards and two touchdowns.
- Utah State LB **Nick Vigil** tallied 13 tackles in last Saturday's contest vs. Nevada. This was his seventh double-digit tackle effort of the year. Vigil ranks third nationally averaging 11.9 stops per game.
- Utah State WR **Hunter Sharp**, who has caught 53 passes for 646 yards and seven touchdowns, returned a kickoff 96 yards for a TD vs. Nevada on Nov. 21. This was the first Utah State kick return TD since 2010.
- Utah State has recovered 12 fumbles this season, which is tied for fourth nationally. Virginia Tech leads the FBS with 15 fumble recoveries.
- The Aggies defense is only allowing 171 passing yards per contest, which ranks ninth nationally and first in the Mountain West. On the other side of the ball, BYU is throwing for 295.9 yards per game.
- BYU has won six of its last seven contests with the lone loss coming on Nov. 14 vs. Missouri (20-16). The Cougars are 3-0 against Mountain West opponents this season, defeating Boise State on Sept. 13 (35-24), San José State on Nov. 6 (17-16) and Fresno State last Saturday (52-10).
- The Cougars have the best red zone offense in the country, converting .953 percent of the time. BYU has been inside the red zone 43 times and has scored on 41 occasions.
- BYU is 3-2 in games decided by seven points or fewer this season.
- The Cougars rank 10th nationally, averaging 3.2 sacks per contest. In five games this season, BYU has racked up more than four sacks.

WHAT TO WATCH FOR

- Colorado State earned bowl eligibility for the third consecutive season, but a win on the road at Fresno State would give the Rams their third straight season with at least seven victories. The last time CSU had three consecutive seasons with at least seven wins was 2001-03.
- Fresno State is looking to avoid its first three-win season since 1978 (3-8).
- Colorado State WR **Rashard Higgins** has caught a pass in 36 consecutive games, every contest he has played in. It is also the longest active streak by a Mountain West player.
- Higgins, who leads all active FBS receivers with 3,496 career receiving yards, has 17 100-yard receiving games, which is tied for the most in Mountain West history with BYU's Austin Collie (17).
- Higgins ranks second in the Mountain West for career receiving TDs (31). Fresno State's Devante Adams holds the record with 38 TD grabs from 2012-13.
- Colorado State LB **Cory James** has recorded 24 career sacks, which is tied for the third-most in Mountain West history and fourth-best all-time at CSU. James' 24 sacks are fourth-most among active FBS defenders.
- The Rams have scored in 36-of-44 quarters this season.
- As a team, CSU is second in the nation with a 43.41 net yards per punt average. Rams punter **Hayden Hunt**, a semifinalist for the Ray Guy Award, ranks fifth nationally and second in the Mountain West with a 46.3 average, trailing San José State's **Michael Carrizosa** (47.9).
- CSU DB **Trent Matthews** has 10 career interceptions, which is good for 10th on the Rams' career list. The last Ram player to log at least 10 career INTs was Erik Olson (1996-99).
- Fresno State RB **Martez Waller** ranks 16th nationally with 2,996 career rushing yards. On the season, Waller has 808 rushing yards and four touchdowns.
- Fresno State's **Ejiro Ederaine** moved into second place in Mountain West history with 44.5 tackles for loss. He is just 3.5 TFLs shy of the all-time MW leader Miles Burris (2008-11) of San Diego State. Among active FBS defenders, Ederaine ranks third.
- The Bulldogs have recovered 11 fumbles this season, which ranks seventh nationally.

WHAT TO WATCH FOR

- Air Force has won five consecutive games, which is the most under head coach **Troy Calhoun** and the longest streak since 2002 (6). The streak also ties for 10th-best nationally.
- Air Force ranks third among all FBS teams in rushing offense, averaging 332.4 yards per game. This is on pace to be the most rushing yards per contest in the **Troy Calhoun** era.
- Air Force has only allowed one sack this season. All other FBS teams have allowed at least three. On a similar note, the Falcons rank fourth nationally in tackles for loss allowed, averaging just 3.8 per game.
- The Falcons are 5-0 this season when producing a 100-yard rusher and have won 11 straight such contests dating back to 2013.
- Just two weeks ago vs. Utah State, Air Force WR **Jalen Robinette** had a career-best 210 receiving yards, which was the third-most in school history and the most by a Falcon since 1978.
- The Falcons have ran 808 total offensive plays, 680 of which have been runs (.842).
- Senior QB **Karson Roberts** has thrown for more than 100 yards in five of his last six games. Last Friday at Boise State, Roberts threw for a career-best 279 yards and two touchdowns. This is the second consecutive season a Falcon QB has recorded back-to-back 200-yard games.
- In the last two weeks, Roberts has thrown for a school record 550 yards.
- Last weekend vs. Colorado State, New Mexico suffered only its second loss under head coach **Bob Davie** when leading after three quarters. The only other defeat came last season vs. Boise State.
- The Lobos have won six games for the first time since 2007, when they compiled a 9-4 record and played in the New Mexico Bowl.
- The Lobos are 3-0 this season when rushing for 300 yards and 3-5 when rushing for fewer than 300 yards. The Lobos have only won three times when rushing for fewer than 200 yards under head coach **Bob Davie**, all three occurrences happening this season (vs. Hawai'i, vs. Utah State and at Boise State).
- New Mexico ranks fourth nationally in red zone defense (.674). Opponents have faced 43 red zone opportunities, but the Lobos defense has only allowed 17 touchdowns and 10 field goals.

WHAT TO WATCH FOR

- San Diego State has won nine consecutive Mountain West games dating back to last season. The Aztecs last Conference loss was at Boise State on Nov. 15, 2014 (38-29). The nine-game league win streak ranks third-longest in the nation. Only Western Kentucky (10) has a longer streak.
- Overall, the Aztecs have a seven-game win streak, their longest since a seven-game stretch to close the 2012 regular season. This winning stretch is fifth-best nationally.
- The Aztecs have won five consecutive games by at least 23 points, the longest streak nationally. In the last five games, SDSU has won by an average of 30.9 points and is averaging 41.8 points.
- The SDSU defense has held 14 consecutive Mountain West opponents to fewer than 400 yards of total offense, the longest stretch (in conference games only) in the nation. The last time an MW foe accounted for more than 400 yards of total offense against the Aztecs defense was Sept. 27, 2014 (UNLV - 455).
- The Aztecs have won 20 straight games when rushing for at least 200 yards and are 28-2 in the **Rocky Long** era when reaching 200-plus yards.
- SDSU has rushed for more than 200 yards in seven straight contests.
- A win on Saturday would give the Aztecs their first nine-win regular season since 2012.
- San Diego State RB **Donnel Pumphrey** rushed for 139 yards and two touchdowns at UNLV last Saturday. This was his seventh straight game with more than 100 yards on the ground, and 20th of his career. The seven straight 100-yard games ties the MW record with BYU's Luke Staley (2001) and Boise State's Jay Ajayi (2014).
- Pumphrey currently ranks 10th in the nation with 1,310 rushing yards. He is one of five Aztecs to record multiple 1,000-yard rushing seasons.
- SDSU defense has the best turnover margin in the nation, recording 28 takeaways and only losing the ball 11 times (+17).
- Nevada RB **James Butler** became the 18th Wolf Pack player to rush for 1,000 yards in a single season, and the first since 2012 (Stephon Jefferson). On the year, Butler has 1,133 yards and eight touchdowns. He has eclipsed 100 rushing yards in four straight games.
- The Wolf Pack are tied for fifth nationally with a turnover margin of +11. Nevada has recorded 20 takeaways and only given the ball away nine times.
- With six total interceptions on the season, **Dameon Baber** is tied for fourth nationally. Baber is also tied for first in the Mountain West with San Diego State's **Damontae Kazee**. The six interceptions are the most by a Nevada player in a single season since Joe Garcia also picked off six passes in 2006.

WHAT TO WATCH FOR

- Hawai'i has dropped nine consecutive games, which is tied for the third-longest losing skid in the nation. Kansas has lost 14 in a row and UCF has dropped 12 straight. The Rainbow Warriors are 0-3 under interim coach **Chris Naeole**.
- Rainbow Warriors LT **Ben Clarke** has only allowed two sacks while protecting the blindside of **Ikaika Woolsey** and **Max Wittek**.
- Hawai'i RB **Paul Harris** rushed for 179 yards on a career-high 29 attempts last week against San José State. This was Harris' third consecutive 100-yard rushing performance. He is the first Rainbow Warrior to accomplish this feat three straight times since James Fenderson in 2000.
- Harris has rushed for more than 100 yards five times this season, which is the most by a Hawai'i rusher since 1992 (Travis Sims - 9).
- Harris is 34 yards shy of becoming the Rainbow Warriors first 1,000-yard rusher since 2010. That year, Alex Green rushed for 1,199 yards.
- Rainbow Warriors DB **Marrell Jackson** is tied for third nationally with three fumble recoveries. This total is second in the Mountain West, behind Utah State's **Kyler Fackrell**.
- ULM is also in the midst of a nine-game losing streak, tied for third-longest nationally with Hawai'i. The Warhawks haven't won since Sept. 12 vs. Nicholls State (47-0).
- The last time the Warhawks won on the road was Nov. 22, 2014 at New Mexico State (30-17).
- ULM LB Hunter Kissinger is tied for fourth nationally, averaging 11.9 tackles per contest. He averages 7.4 solo stops per game, ranking second in the nation.
- Warhawks WR Rashon Ceaser has caught a pass in 37 consecutive games, a streak that ranks tied for sixth among active FBS players. On the year, Ceaser has 31 receptions for 325 yards and two touchdowns.



2015 MOUNTAIN WEST FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

The 2015 Mountain West Football Championship game will kick off at 4:30 p.m. PT/5:30 p.m. MT on Saturday, December 5. ESPN2 will broadcast the title match-up.

HOST SITE DETERMINATION

Host Determination. The Conference Football Championship Game shall be played at the site of the divisional champion with the highest College Football Playoff (CFP) Selection Committee ranking. The site determination shall be made no later than the Sunday following the final week of regular-season games, utilizing the latest available CFP poll.

If one divisional champion was ranked ahead of the other divisional champion in the CFP Selection Committee ranking and wins in the final weekend of the regular season, they will be declared the host. If, in that same scenario, the divisional champion that was the highest-ranked in the CFP poll loses in the final weekend of the regular season, a composite of selected computer rankings following the games of November 29 will be used to determine the host.

If no Mountain West teams are ranked in the latest available CFP Selection Committee poll, a composite of selected computer rankings following the games of November 28 will be used to determine the host.

Host Tie Breaker. In the event of a tie in the latest CFP Selection Committee ranking or the composite of selected computer rankings, the following comparison procedure shall be used (in order as necessary) to determine the site of the game:

- If one team was the winner of a Conference game between the two teams, it shall be the Championship Game host.
- If a tie still exists, winning percentage against common Conference opponents shall determine the Championship Game host.
- If a tie still exists, winning percentage against the next highest-placed common opponent in the Conference based upon (in order): 1. order of finish in the respective divisions, 2. record in all Conference games, and 3. most recent composite of selected computer rankings, proceeding through the Conference, will break the tie.
- Coin toss.

Divisional Champions. A divisional champion shall be the team with the highest winning percentage in all Conference games, both inter-divisional and intra-divisional, in the division. (Adopted January 2013)

- Tie Games. A tie football game shall count as half-a-game won and half-a-game lost in the standings

[Note: A team ineligible under NCAA or Mountain West rules for post-season (bowl) competition shall not compete in the Championship Game.]

DIVISIONAL TIEBREAKERS

Tie Between Two Teams. In the event of a percentage tie for a divisional championship between two teams, if one team was the winner of the Conference game between the two teams, it shall be the divisional champion.

If no game was played between the two tied teams, or that game ended in a tie, the following comparison procedure shall be used to break the tie:

- Winning percentage in games played within the division.
- Winning percentage against the next highest-placed team in the division (based upon the team's record in all games played in the Conference), proceeding through the division.
- Winning percentage against common Conference opponents.
- Highest CFP ranking (or the composite of selected computer rankings if neither team is ranked in the CFP rankings) following the final week of Conference regular-season games.
- Overall winning percentage against FBS opponents.
- Coin toss.

Tie Between More Than Two Teams:

In the event of a percentage tie for a divisional championship between more than two teams, the following comparison procedure shall be used to eliminate all but two tied teams, at which point the two-team tie-breaking procedure shall be used:

- Winning percentage in games played among the tied teams.
- Winning percentage in games played against division opponents.
- Winning percentage against the next highest-placed team in the division (based upon the team's record in all games played in the Conference), proceeding through the division.
- Winning percentage against common Conference opponents.
- Highest CFP ranking (or the composite of selected computer rankings if neither team is ranked in the CFP rankings) following the final week of Conference regular-season games

MW BOWL SYNOPSIS

The number of postseason appearances for the Mountain West will be driven by on-the-field performance, starting with the opportunity to play in the national semifinals or another New Year's Day bowl game as part of the College Football Playoff arrangement. The highest-rated champion from among the five non-contracted conferences (American, C-USA, MAC, MW, Sun Belt, or chosen by the playoff selection committee) is guaranteed a slot in the system. In the 16 seasons since the league's inception, the Mountain West's champion or a current MW member has secured that position 12 times, placing teams in the Fiesta (3), Rose and Sugar (2) Bowls during that period.

The MW also has agreements with seven (7) different bowl games that in any given year will generate as many as seven (7) postseason opportunities for its member institutions. These include primary positions in some or all years with the Lockheed Martin Armed Forces Bowl, Famous Idaho Potato Bowl, Gildan New Mexico Bowl, Royal Purple Las Vegas Bowl, San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl, Hawai'i Bowl and the Arizona Bowl - and a secondary position with the Cactus Bowl.

NOTE: The MW is the primary backup for the Ticket City Cactus Bowl if the Big 12 or Pac-12 does not fill.

ABOUT THE COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYOFF

In its second season, the College Football Playoff format remains unchanged: top four teams, two semifinals played in bowl games, and the national championship game played in a different city every year. Each semifinal will be played during the New Year's holiday with the national championship game in prime time on a Monday night at least a week later.

THE SELECTION COMMITTEE

A selection committee will choose the four teams for the playoff based on their performances during the regular season, including strength of schedule, head-to-head results, championships won, and other factors. The teams will be seeded so that #1 will play #4 in one semifinal and #2 will meet #3 in the other, with the winners advancing to the national championship game.

THE ROTATION

The semifinals will rotate among six different bowls, extending the experience to more fans. In the years when the bowls are not hosting semifinals, the bowls will feature eight other teams in four compelling matchups.
