WILDCATS LOOK TO EXTEND NON-CONFERENCE WIN STREAK

Kentucky plays host to Sun Belt Conference member Louisiana-Monroe on Hall of Fame Weekend, carrying an active 16-game win streak against non-conference opponents that dates back to 2006. It's the second-longest non-conference win streak in the nation.

Last week, UK earned its first victory over Auburn in 43 years with a 21-14 victory at Jordan-Hare Stadium. ULM is coming off a 16-10 win over Arkansas State at home on Tues. Oct. 13.

At Auburn, UK totaled a season-high 282 rushing yards – the most against an SEC opponent in 14 years. The Wildcats produced two 100-yard rushers in the game as Derrick Locke gained a career-high 126 yards and Randall Cobb rushed for career-best 109 yards. Each of the three quarterbacks – Morgan Newton, Will Fidler and Cobb - rushed for one UK touchdown in the victory.

UK's defense held Auburn to 14 points and 315 total offensive yards, both season lows. Danny Trevathan and Sam Maxwell achieved career highs in tackles with 14 and 10, respectively. Fellow line-backer Micah Johnson charted a season-high 14 stops (one shy of his career high) and was named SEC Defensive Player of the Week. Coming off an injury, cornerback Paul Warford also was impressive, totaling six tackles and three pass breakups.

QUICK NOTES

- Saturday is UK Athletics Hall of Fame weekend and Military Appreciation Day.
- Junior quarterback Mike Hartline continues to be sidelined indefinitely with a knee injury. UK's starting quarterback is projected to be junior backup Will Fidler or true freshman Morgan Newton. Both signal callers saw action in the Auburn game, along with Randall Cobb when UK uses the Wildcat formation.
- Kentucky enters the game with a streak of 16 consecutive non-conference wins. It is the second-longest active non-conference win streak in the nation and the longest for UK since a 17-game non-conference win stretch from 1954-60.
- Kentucky is averaging 186.5 rushing yards per game. It's the team's best mark since the 1995 Wildcats rushed for 196 yards per contest.
- UK is coming off a 21-14 win at Auburn. It marked the Cats' first win over the Tigers in 43 years (1966) and their first win at Auburn in 48 years (1961).
- Kentucky had no penalties against Auburn. The last time that happened was at VU in 1991.
- All three of UK's losses have been against teams ranked in the nation's top 25, including the top two programs (Alabama and Florida).
- RB Derrick Locke leads the SEC and ranks 14th nationally in all-purpose yards (162.0) and leads the SEC and ranks sixth nationally in kick return average (32.1 per runback).
- WR Randall Cobb also is a proven all-purpose threat for the Wildcats this season. The sophomore ranks in the SEC's top 10 in receptions per game (7th - 4.0), receiving yards per game (10th - 53.7), scoring (T-2nd - 7.0 ppg), punt return average (3rd - 8.9), and all-purpose yards (5th - 129.5 per game).

SERIES HISTORY AGAINST LOUISIANA-MONROE

Kentucky and Louisiana-Monroe meet for just the fourth time in school history ... All three meetings have taken place at Commonwealth Stadium ... Kentucky first played the Warhawks in 1994, losing to ULM (then known as Northeast Louisiana) 21-14 ... Kentucky has taken the last two games, defeating Northeast Louisiana 49-14 in 1997 and taking a 42-40 win over ULM in 2006 ... Kentucky is 9-1 all-time vs. members of ULM's Sun Belt Conference.

ON THIS DATE IN WILDCAT HISTORY

Saturday's matchup with Louisiana-Monroe marks just the 16th time in school history that the Wildcats have played on October 24. UK has a 7-8 all-time record on games played on this date. The most recent game was in 1998 when the Cats nearly upset No. 11 Georgia at Commonwealth Stadium. In fact, the last seven games played on this date have been against the Bulldogs. The Wildcats have not won on this date since 1953, when they beat Villanova 19-0 in Lexington. Saturday's game against Louisiana-Monroe marks the first time since 1970, a span of four games, that UK has not faced a ranked team on this date.

LAST TIME VS. LOUISIANA-MONROE

Kentucky wide receiver Keenan Burton caught multiple touchdown passes for a school-record fourth consecutive game as the Wildcats held off Louisiana-Monroe for a 42-40 win on Senior Day in Commonwealth Stadium in 2006.

The Wildcats, who tied a school record with their sixth home win of the season, trailed after three quarters when Calvin Dawson scored his third touchdown on a one-yard plunge, and the extra point put Louisiana-Monroe on top 34-33.

But the Wildcats, who notched their third consecutive comeback victory after trailing in the fourth quarter, took the lead for good four minutes later on a 34-yard field goal by Lones Seiber.

Burton scored his third touchdown of the day on a 25-yard pass from quarterback André Woodson with 8:17 left in the game to extend UK's advantage to eight, 42-34. Louisiana-Monroe quarterback Kinson Lancaster led the Warhawks downfield and scored on a one-yard sneak, cutting the lead to 42-40 with a minute left. But UK preserved the win when defensive end Jeremy Jarmon stopped Lancaster on the two-point conversion attempt.

Woodson finished the day 25-of-35 for 359 yards with three touchdown strikes, marking the fourth consecutive game he has thrown for 250 yards or more with multiple touchdown passes.

Burton caught nine passes for 115 yards with a career-high three touchdown receptions. He had 257 all-purpose yards on the game, marking the second consecutive week and third time that year he went over 200. Tailback Rafael Little had 255 all-purpose yards, including an 84-yard punt return touchdown.

ULM rushed for 351 yards, paced by Dawson (179 yards), Lancaster (85), and Erroll Hogan (82). Linebacker Wesley Woodyard led the defensive effort with 12 tackles, including a quarterback sack. Cornerback Karl Booker posted his first interception of the season.

UK TO INDUCT HALL OF FAME CLASS

The University of Kentucky will welcome its new 2009 Hall of Fame Class in conjunction with the football weekend against Louisiana-Monroe. UK will induct the new class on Oct. 23 and honor the class during the football game on Oct. 24.

The class includes former volleyball coach Kathy DeBoer, football player Wilbur Hackett, baseball player and contributor Jim Host, swimmer Rachel Komisarz, basketball player Mike Pratt and pitcher Brandon Webb. The committee granted previously announced diver Tina Johnson Ybarra's request to be moved from the 2008 class to the 2009 class for induction.

The UK Athletics Hall of Fame was started in 2005 to recognize and honor persons whose participation and contributions enriched and strengthened the University's athletic program. The charter class included 88 individuals who had previously had their jersey retired by UK.

There is a five-year waiting period – after leaving UK – to be eligible for inclusion into the Hall of Fame, and a 10-year waiting period to have a jersey retired. An individual must be a member of the Hall of Fame to be eligible for jersey retirement.

A committee consisting of Hall of Famers, media members, campus representatives and current coaches and administrators elects new inductees each year.

MILITARY APPRECIATION DAY

SECOND-LARGEST CROWD TO SEE A KENTUCKY VICTORY

Kentucky's 21-14 win at Auburn on Saturday marked the second-largest crowd ever to see a Wildcat football victory.

The UK-AU game drew 86,217 fans to Jordan-Hare Stadium. The only larger crowd to see the Wildcats triumph was in 1984, when UK won at Tennessee before 93,791 fans in Neyland Stadium.

DÉJÀ VU IN AUBURN

You already know that Kentucky's victory against Auburn was the first since 1966, ending a streak of 15 consecutive losses against the Tigers.

However, it was only Kentucky's second victory ever in Auburn, with the previous triumph coming in 1961. It's interesting to note that both games followed remarkably similar paths.

In 1961, Auburn's John McGeever opened the scoring by blocking a Kentucky field goal and returning it 82 yards for a touchdown. Kentucky came from behind in the fourth quarter with a six-yard touchdown pass from Jerry Woolum to Tom Hutchinson with 3:12 left in the game for a 14-12 victory. That Kentucky win, by the way, ended a 30-game home winning streak which still remains as the longest home win streak in Auburn history.

Forty-eight years later, Auburn opened the scoring by blocking a field goal and returning it 69 yards for a touchdown. Once again, Kentucky rallied in the fourth quarter with touchdown runs by Will Fidler and Randall Cobb for a 21-14 victory. Cobb's game-winning score came with 3:17 left on the clock, just five seconds different than the 1961 game.

(A tip o' the hat to long-time Auburn sports information director David Housel for providing this historical nugget.)

FIRST GAME WITHOUT A PENALTY IN 18 YEARS

Kentucky did not incur a penalty in the win over Auburn, the first time the Wildcats had not drawn a flag in 18 years, since the 1991 contest at Vanderbilt.

HELMET STICKER FOR RICH BROOKS

Chris Low, the Southeastern Conference beat writer for ESPN.com, was effusive in his praise for Rich Brooks following last night's victory over Auburn, awarding the Wildcat coach a "helmet sticker" for the Wildcats' performance.

"Boy, did he deserve this one," Low wrote. "His Kentucky team deserved this one. This is a

program that would have faded into oblivion in the past after losing three straight games and having so many key players go down with injuries. But Brooks kept his guys focused and kept them believing, and the Wildcats went to the Plains and took out Auburn 21-14 on Saturday. It's a win that very much keeps alive the Wildcats' bowl chances, as they evened their record at 3-3."

Low also wrote about Brooks in his roundup column, "What we Learned in the SEC: Week 7":

"Kentucky follows its leader: The Rich Brooks legacy at Kentucky will be closely tied to the Wildcats' three straight bowl victories the last three seasons and how he's elevated the program to respectability at a school where basketball is king. But Brooks' legacy goes even deeper than that. He's brought a sense of toughness to Kentucky football, a sense of class to Kentucky football and a no-excuses resolve that should serve this program well long after he's retired and back home fishing in Oregon. It's fitting that Brooks is a former boxer, because his teams at Kentucky have never quit fighting. The Wildcats lost a heartbreaker two weeks ago at South Carolina,

and in doing so, lost their starting quarterback. They were already without their best defender, cornerback Trevard Lindley, but never blinked on the heels of a three-game losing streak and went into Auburn on Saturday night and won 21-14 thanks to some gritty defense and a balanced running game. Brooks gave props to everybody from his backup quarterback, to his coaches, to his punter after the game and called it the 'ultimate team win.' Well, here's giving some props to Brooks. There's a reason his teams play with so much heart."

TOUGH STRETCH FOR WILDCATS

No. 1 Florida and No. 3 Alabama marked the highest-ranked back-to-back opponents for the Wildcats in school history. The previous most highly ranked consecutive opponents was in 1964 when UK took on No. 1 Ole Miss and No. 7 Auburn in successive contests.

Kentucky played a third-consecutive ranked foe as South Carolina was No. 25 on Oct. 10. The Auburn game could have been the fourth-consecutive week for UK to play a ranked opponent, but the Tigers just barely missed the cut for the top 25.

"KEEP MAKING HISTORY"

Coach Rich Brooks frequently talks to his team about doing things that have never been done at Kentucky, or haven't been done in a long time.

The Wildcats hit some historical milestones in their three victories this season:

- Kentucky's 42-0 win vs. Miami was the Wildcats' first shutout in 13 years.
- Defeating Miami marked UK's third-consecutive season-opening win, longest since a streak of eight consecutive season-opening victories from 1987-94.
- Kentucky's 31-27 win over Louisville was the third-consecutive triumph over the Wildcats' in-state rivals, the first time that has been accomplished since the Governor's Cup rivalry was renewed in 1994.
- UK defeated Auburn for the first time in 43 years. UK's last victory was in Lexington (17-7) in 1966. It also marked UK's first win at Auburn since 1961.

UK IN THE BLUE ZONE (20-AND-IN)

Kentucky has converted 17 of 21 opportunities (81.0 percent) in the "Blue Zone" (20-yard-line and in) for 107 points (14 touchdowns, three field goals, one blocked FG, two loss on downs, one end of half). That ranks seventh in the SEC.

UK ranks sixth in the SEC in "Blue Zone" defense as opponents have converted 17 of 21 opportunities (81.0 percent) for 99 points (12 touchdowns, 5-7 field goals).

QUARTER-BY-QUARTER

The Wildcats have outscored opponents 56-28 in the second quarter and 48-28 in the fourth quarter. The first quarter hasn't been as kind as opponents are outscoring the Cats 59-19 in the opening quarter. The Cats trail 33-24 in the third.



Commonwealth Stadium



On game day, Commonwealth Stadium usually becomes the third-largest city in Kentucky.

The Cats are in their 37th season at Commonwealth Stadium.

Rich Brooks is 23-21 (.523) overall in seven seasons at Commonwealth Stadium.

Since its opening in 1973, Kentucky has played 231 games within the friendly confines of Commonwealth Stadium. UK has a 123-104-4 record (.542) in Commonwealth.

Kentucky has broken the school record for attendance each of the last two seasons, once again ranking in the nation's top 25. UK has ranked in the nation's top 25 in attendance in nine of the last 10 seasons.

Kentucky broke the single-season attendance record again in 2008 with an average of 69,434 per game. The previous mark was 68,824 in the 2007 season.

The crowd of 71,024 vs. Florida on Oct. 20, 2007 was the largest crowd in the 35-year history of Commonwealth Stadium. The previous stadium record was 71,022 for the 1999 Tennessee game.

The playing surface is named C. M. Newton Field in honor of the former UK Director of Athletics.

Facts and Figures on Commonwealth Stadium:

Seating Capacity: 67,942, including the Commonwealth Suites. With game workers, media, etc., total attendance can exceed 70,000.

Video Boards: Mitsubishi Diamond Vision, 19 x 34 feet on the west end zone (University Drive) and 16 x 28.5 feet on the east end zone (Nutter Field House).

Sound System: Coordinated by Mitsubishi as part of the video board project.

Scoreboards: Two, one in each end zone, constructed by Fairtron Scoreboards.

Game Day Experiences

The "Cat Walk": Fans are encouraged to greet the team when the Wildcats arrive for the "Cat Walk." The team buses will arrive at the Nutter Field House approximately two hours and 15 minutes before the game and the players will make the "Cat Walk" to their stadium entry point at Gate 1. Fans are encouraged to line up on the sidewalk and cheer the players as they enter the stadium.

A siren will be sounded while the team buses are on their way to the stadium. That's the fans' cue to proceed to the Cat Walk area to greet the team.

Wildcat Refuge: Fans of all ages, but especially the younger Wildcats, will enjoy playing at the Wildcat Refuge, located outside of the southwest corner (outside Gate 9) of Commonwealth Stadium. There are five giant inflatable games that are available two hours before kickoff.

UK Marching Band Will Parade Around Stadium: The UK Marching Band will parade around the stadium, beginning approximately one hour prior to kickoff. The band and parade will begin at and return to Gate 4.

CATS ONE OF THE NATION'S TOP TEAMS IN QUARTERBACK PROTECTION

Kentucky's experienced offensive line has picked up where it left off last year in protecting its quarterback. The Wildcats rank tied for 16th nationally and tied for second in the SEC in the sacks allowed category. In six games, UK has allowed just six sacks.

Last year, the offensive line gave up only 13 quarterback sacks and ranked fourth in the nation in fewest sacks allowed per game. The UK line also helped the team rank eighth nationally in fewest tackles for loss allowed per game.

COBB'S JOBS

Kentucky sophomore Randall Cobb is proving to be a utility player for the Wildcats. He is playing primarily at wide receiver this season, with occasional action at quarterback in the "Wildcat" formation, he returns punts and kickoffs and also is the holder for extra points and field goals. He currently ranks in the top 10 of five SEC statistical categories

In the season opener, Cobb totaled seven receptions for a career-high 96 yards and charted a rushing and receiving touchdown for the first time in the same game. Against Louisville, Cobb charted six catches for a team-high 71 yards, including the game-winning touchdown in the fourth quarter.

He was a pivotal player in UK's first win over Auburn in 43 years as he rushed for a career-high 109 yards on 12 carries. It marked the first 100-yard rushing game of his career.

In the fourth quarter, Cobb rushed four yards for UK's go-ahead score with 3:17 remaining in the game. He set up the game-winning touchdown with a career-long 61-yard run in that scoring drive.

TOUCHDOWN MAKER

Wide receiver Randall Cobb has scored seven of Kentucky's 19 touchdowns this season. The sophomore has scored at least one touchdown in nine of 16 career games, including seven of the last nine. He currently ranks tied for second in the SEC in scoring, averaging 7.0 points per game.

ALL-PURPOSE LOCKE

Through six games, sophomore running back Derrick Locke leads the SEC and ranks 14th nationally in all-purpose yards per game. He now averages 162.0 all-purpose yards per game.

He also leads the SEC and ranks sixth in the nation in kick return average with 32.1 yards per return. Locke is UK's leading rusher with 76.5 yards per game, which ranks fifth in the SEC and is UK's third-leading receiver with 16 catches.

LOCKE HITS THE MILLENIUM MARK

Junior tailback Derrick Locke became the 31st player in Kentucky history to reach 1,000 rushing yards in his career after gaining 75 yards in the Alabama game. Locke now has 1,283 rushing yards as a Wildcat. He needs 14 more yards to move ahead of Don Phelps (1946-49) at No. 21.

Senior tailback Alfonso Smith has 853 career rushing yards. He needs 147 more to reach the 1,000-yard mark.

Because of his numerous contributions to the school in those 18 years, Oregon named its football field "Brooks Field" in his honor in 1995.
- Played collegiate football at Oregon State from 1959-62 under Coach Tommy Prothro. Brooks was a single-wing tailback on the freshman team, then played defensive back for three years on varsity. He was also a reserve quarterback in addition to playing in the secondary.
- Received bachelor's degree in physical education (1963) and master's in education (1964)

With injuries to veteran cornerbacks Paul Warford and Trevard Lindley, true freshmen Martavious Neloms earned his first career start vs. South Carolina. With injury to quarterback Mike Hartline, true freshman Morgan Newton saw his first career start at Auburn.

BACK-TO-BACK-TO-BACK SUCCESS

Kentucky won seven games in 2008 season, including a victory over East Carolina in the AutoZone Liberty Bowl, after posting identical eight-win campaigns and championships of the Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowl in both the 2006 and 2007 seasons.

The success marked a series of milestones for the Wildcats:

- First time in school history to win bowl games in three consecutive seasons
- First time to win seven games in three consecutive seasons in 58 years, since 1949-51
- UK is one of only 11 NCAA teams that have won bowl games the last three seasons

COMEBACK CATS

Kentucky has won 23 of its last 38 games, with 11 of those wins coming as fourth-quarter comebacks.

To put it in perspective, prior to that, you have to go back 146 games in order to find 10 fourth-quarter comeback victories for the Wildcats.



Sophomore wide receiver Randall Cobb ranks in the top 10 of five SEC statistical categories. He has scored at least one touchdown in nine of 17 career games, including seven of the last nine.

In 2006, the Cats set a school record by completing three consecutive fourth-quarter comebacks to defeat Georgia,

Vanderbilt and Louisiana-Monroe in succession. In 2007, Kentucky came from behind in the final period to knock off No. 1 LSU, then-No. 9 Louisville and Arkansas. In fact, UK outscored its opponents 119-81 in the fourth quarter in '07. Last season, the Wildcats outscored their opponents 111-66 in the final quarter.

The 2008 win over Arkansas tied the largest Kentucky fourth-quarter comeback in school history. The Wildcats trailed 20-7 in the final stanza against the Razorbacks and came back to win, 21-20. UK trailed Vanderbilt 13-0 in the fourth quarter in 2004 and came back to win, 14-13.

Earlier this season against Louisville, UK trailed 27-24 with just under six minutes remaining in the game when UK's A.J. Nance recovered a fumble on a muffed punt return at the UoFL 24-yard line. Nance's recovery set up the game-winning score when wide receiver Randall Cobb made a leaping 12-yard touchdown catch from quarterback Mike Hartline to give the Cats their final margin of victory.

Against Auburn, Kentucky trailed 14-7 entering the fourth quarter but rallied with touchdown runs by Will Fidler and Randall Cobb for a 21-14 victory. Cobb's game-winning score came with 3:17 left on the clock.

UK HOLDS NATION'S SECOND-LONGEST NON-CONFERENCE WIN STREAK

Kentucky's 31-27 win over Louisville on Sept. 19 was UK's 16th consecutive non-conference victory, which is tied for the nation's second-longest streak in the nation.

It is Kentucky's longest non-conference win streak since a 17-game stretch from 1954-60.

THE OFFENSE

- The Wildcats' offense has shown remarkable balance, as UK has gained 1,119 yards rushing and 912 yards passing this season. UK's rushing yardage and passing yardage have been within 50 yards of each other in five of six games this season.
- UK has scored at least 20 points in five of its six games this season. The Cats' 20 points vs. Alabama was the second-highest point total against the Tide defense this year.
- The Wildcats have gained over 300 yards on offense in five of six games this season.
- UK totaled 301 yards of total offense against the Tide, becoming the first team to reach 300 yards total offense against Alabama this season.
- UK totaled 360 yards of total offense against South Carolina, the most the Gamecocks have allowed this season.
- Kentucky totaled 42 points, 488 yards and 29 first downs in the season opener against Miami. It's the most in all three categories since the record-setting 2007 season.
- UK totaled a season-high 282 rushing yards at Auburn. It marked the most rushing yards since 297 yards vs. Norfolk State in 2008 and the most against an SEC opponent since 301 yard vs. Mississippi State in 1995.

WILDCAT FORMATION HAS WORKED WELL

Kentucky's "Wildcat" formation, in which wide receiver Randall Cobb takes a shotgun snap from center, has worked well this season.

Against Miami, UK scored on both possessions the formation was used. In the second quarter from the RedHawk 16-yard line, Cobb handed off to tailback Derrick Locke, who swept right end for a touchdown. In the third quarter, this time from the Miami 17, Cobb gave the ball to Locke for a six-yard gain. On the next play, Cobb kept it himself and found a gap around right end for an 11-yard touchdown run.

In the fourth quarter at South Carolina, Cobb ran an entire drive from the formation and engineered a 70-yard march for a touchdown.

In the fourth quarter vs. Auburn, Cobb scampered a career-long 61 yards

from the "Wildcat" to set up UK's go-ahead score. Two plays later, he rushed for a four-yard touchdown with 3:17 remaining in the game.

Cobb was one of the nation's most versatile players last season, splitting his time between quarterback, wide receiver and punt returner, roles he is continuing in 2009.

CONTINUING TO REBUILD

After graduating several stars from the 2007 offense that scored more points than any team in school history, Kentucky fielded a very inexperienced attack last season.

Despite the youth, UK still managed to rank sixth in the SEC in scoring offense with an average 22.6 points per game.

UK has six starters back from last season. Based on returning production, UK has 73 percent of the rushing yardage, 100 percent of the passing yardage, and 73.6 percent of the receiving yardage back from the 2008 squad.

UK OFFENSE NO JOKE UNDER PHILLIPS

The Kentucky offense has had both success and balance since Joker Phillips became offensive coordinator in 2005.

Under Phillips' guidance, UK improved its points per game and total offense in three consecutive seasons, from 2005 to 2006 to 2007, eventually scoring a school record 475 points in the '07 season. Despite massive graduation losses from the '07 unit, UK still managed to finish sixth in the SEC in

scoring offense a year ago.

The Kentucky offense has had good balance under Phillips' guidance, with 3,000-yard passers (Andre' Woodson, twice) 1,000-yard receivers (Keenan Burton and Steve Johnson) and 1,000-yard rushers (Rafael Little, twice).

QUARTERBACKS

- Junior quarterback Mike Hartline will not see action Saturday due to a knee injury sustained in the third quarter against South Carolina. In his absence, junior Will Fidler and freshman Morgan Newton will split time as the signal caller.
- Newton, along with fellow freshman QB Ryan Mossakowski, were rated as two of the nation's top quarterbacks in the 2009 recruiting class. Newton earned his first career start vs. Auburn and completed 5-of-13 passes for 39 yards. He also rushed for his first collegiate touchdown in the second quarter, a four-yard run. He finished with eight carries for 15 yards.
- Kentucky has an 8-6 (.571) record with junior Mike Hartline as the starting quarterback. He has completed 60.6 percent of his passes for 792 yards and six touchdowns.
- Kentucky has an 1-0 record with freshman Morgan Newton as the starting quarterback.
- Kentucky has an 1-3 record with sophomore Randall Cobb as the starting quarterback, all in 2008.

RUNNING BACKS

- Kentucky hopes to secure its running game this season with the "Locke-Smith" combination at tailback. Senior Alfonso Smith has rushed for 853 yards in his career and a 4.5-yard average per carry. Locke, a junior, has 1,283 career rushing yards with a 5.0 average per attempt.

Both tailbacks are recovering from injuries, however. Smith hurt his foot in the spring game in April and Locke is bouncing back from a knee injury and reconstructive surgery sustained last October.

- UK totaled a season-high 282 rushing yards at Auburn. It marked the most rushing yards since 297 yards vs. Norfolk State in 2008 and the most against an SEC opponent since 301 yard vs. Mississippi State in 1995.

- Coach Rich Brooks believes fullback John Conner is one of the best at his position in all of college football. Conner was named the "best blocking back in the SEC" by the *Birmingham News* and also is an effective runner and pass catcher. He did not see action in the season-opener because of injury, but rebounded against Louisville to chart three carries for 28 yards and a touchdown, including a crucial 23-yard burst on a 4th-and-1 play.

WIDE RECEIVERS/TIGHT ENDS

- Sophomore Randall Cobb ranks tied for seventh in the SEC in receptions per game. In six games he has 24 catches for 322 yards for an average of 4.0 catches per game.
- Cobb totaled seven receptions for a career-high 96 yards and a TD vs. Miami. Cobb had a rushing and receiving touchdown in one game for the first time in his career.
- Against Louisville, Cobb caught the game-winning touchdown in the fourth quarter, giving him a scoring grab for the second consecutive game to open the season.
- Cobb's 55-yard grab from Hartline in the second quarter vs. South Carolina was a career-long reception.
- Against Auburn, Cobb finished with 12 carries for a career-high 109 yards. It marked the first 100-yard rushing game of his career. Cobb later rushed four yards for UK's go-ahead score with 3:17 remaining in the game. He set up the game-winning touchdown with a career-long 61-yard run in that drive.
- Junior Kyrus Lanxter achieved season highs with three receptions and 26 yards against Alabama.
- Sophomore Gene McCaskill tied a career high with three catches for a season-high 51 yards vs. South Carolina.
- Sophomore Matt Roark earned his second and third career receptions vs. UofL, both good for first downs and 15 total yards.
- Junior-college transfer Chris Matthews came up big in his first UK game as he caught four passes for 57 yards and a touchdown against Miami. He hauled in a career-high six receptions for 34 yards against Louisville. Overall, he is UK's second-leading receiver with 17 catches for 170 yards.
- Three seniors, T.C. Drake, Maurice Grinter and Ross Bogue, give the team good experience and depth at tight end. UK tight ends have combined for nine receptions this season.
- TE Ross Bogue scored his first career touchdown vs. Florida on a 2-yard reception from QB Mike Hartline in the second quarter.

OFFENSIVE LINE

Kentucky is fielding the second-most experienced offensive line in the Southeastern Conference in 2009, based on the number of games started by returning players. UK has nine returning offensive linemen who have combined to start 117 games in their careers, including tackle Zipp Duncan (32 starts), tackle Justin Jeffries (26), guard Christian Johnson (21), center Jorge Gonzalez (18), guard Stuart Hines (6), tackle Brad Durham (5), guard Jake Lanefski (4), tackle Billy Joe Murphy (3) and center Marcus Davis (1).

Only Georgia has a more experienced group by that mode of measurement. (Research done by Darren Everson for *The Wall Street Journal*.)

With help from the offensive line, UK totaled a season-high 282 rushing yards against Auburn. It marked the most rushing yards since 297 yards vs. Norfolk State in 2008 and the most against an SEC opponent since 301 yards vs. Mississippi State in 1995.

Junior center Marcus Davis made his first collegiate start vs. the RedHawks. Redshirt freshman Matt Smith finished the game at center after Davis suffered an ankle injury that will sideline him for most or all of the season.

Senior Justin Jeffries missed the South Carolina game with an injury. Junior Brad Durham recorded his first season and fourth career start in Jeffries' absence.

Through six games, the O-line has allowed only six sacks this season. UK ranks tied for second in the SEC and tied for 16th nationally in the sacks allowed category (1.00 per game).

THE DEFENSE

With an assortment of bumps and bruises accumulating through the during the first month of the season, UK was forced to play less experienced players in the secondary against South

Carolina.

True freshman Martavius Neloms earned his first career start at cornerback for the injured All-American Trevard Lindley while sophomore Randall Burden started for junior cornerback Paul Warford. Warford has missed the Alabama and South Carolina games with a quad muscle strain and Lindley suffered an ankle injury vs. Alabama. Redshirt freshman Cartier Rice is seeing action in the secondary as well.

Warford returned to action against Auburn and had one of his best games. He totaled six tackles and a career-high tying three pass breakups.

NOTES FROM THE SHUTOUT

The defense shut out Miami in the season opener, marking UK's first shut out since defeating Vanderbilt, 25-0, in 1996.

The defense recorded two interceptions against Miami. In addition, the unit recorded three sacks, 11 pass breakups and three quarterback hurries.

The defense held Miami to 10 first downs. The last time UK held an opponent to 10 or fewer first downs was eight vs. Western Kentucky on Sept. 27, 2008.

The defense held Miami to 2-of-15 on third down conversions. That's the lowest percentage of third down conversions since 1-of-13 vs. Norfolk State on Sept. 6, 2008.

TURNOVERS TELL THE TALE

It's often called the most important statistic in football. Since the 2006 season, Kentucky is +18 in turnover margin. In the last 45 games, Kentucky has totaled 93 takeaways (45 fumble recoveries and 48 interceptions) while committing just 75 turnovers.

In 2006, the Cats were second nationally with a +15 turnover margin. Last season, they were 35th

in the nation at +5. However, UK is -1 in turnover margin so far this season.

DEFENSIVE NUMBERS IMPROVING

Kentucky's defensive yardage allowed has shown significant progress during the last two seasons. The advancement coincided with the maturing of a young group of players along with the appointment of Steve Brown as defensive coordinator in 2007.

The Wildcats' total defense is the nation's most improved over the last two years, reducing yardage allowed by 121 yards per game during that span.

MANY SHOES TO FILL

The Wildcat defense has numerous shoes to fill following the departure of seven starters from last year's defense. All seven of those players signed NFL contracts.

On the plus side, four regular starters return along with 15 additional lettermen.

LINDLEY MAKES A BIG DIFFERENCE

Senior cornerback Trevard Lindley has made several game-changing plays while at Kentucky. He currently has 10 interceptions and 38 pass breakups during his Wildcat career. Seven of his 10 interceptions have been key plays in Kentucky

victories, with the eighth pick helping send a game into overtime. He led the team in breakups each of the last three seasons and now holds UK's career record with 38. He currently is tied for fourth in the SEC in passes defended with 1.25 per game. He also is the only defensive player to score a touchdown for the Wildcats this season.

Here's a list of his biggest plays:

- Game-clinching interception in win over Georgia as a freshman
- Acrobatic endzone interception plus a fumble recovery in the 2006 Music City Bowl win over Clemson
- Interception and long return on first play of the game in 2007 win over No. 9-ranked Louisville
- 66-yard fumble return for TD in 2007 win at Arkansas
- Interception in win over No. 1 LSU in 2007
- Career-high eight tackles and an interception that helped send the 2007 Tennessee game into overtime
- Caused a fumble and had a career-high three pass breakups in 2007 Music City Bowl triumph over Florida State
- Interception return for a touchdown vs. South Carolina in 2008
- Interception return for a touchdown vs. Miami in 2009; also had three pass breakups in that game and was named SEC Defensive Player of the Week
- Lindley has scored a defensive touchdown in each of the last three seasons -- fumble return at Arkansas in 2007, interceptions for TDs vs. South Carolina in 2008 and Miami in 2009

MAXWELL RANKS AMONG NATION'S TOP PASS DEFENDERS

Senior linebacker Sam Maxwell currently ranks tied for fourth in the SEC and ranks 23rd nationally in passes defended, averaging 1.17 per game. He has totaled five pass breakups and two interceptions in six games this season. He also is UK's fifth-leading tackler with 36 stops, including 2.5 for loss. He charted a career-high 10 tackles at Auburn.

THE FRONT FOUR

- Senior defensive tackle Corey Peters is the only returning starter in the defensive line. Peters has 122 tackles in his career, including 22.5 tackles for loss and 10.5 quarterback sacks. He currently ranks sixth in tackles for loss in the SEC and tied for sixth in sacks.

- In the South Carolina game, Peters totaled seven tackles and a career-high 2.5 sacks. He was named SEC Defensive Lineman of the Week.

- Junior Ricky Lumpkin is the other starter at tackle. He played well as a backup the last two seasons. The primary reserves at tackle are junior Shane McCord and Mark Crawford, a junior-college transfer who is a sophomore in eligibility.

- Kentucky is extremely inexperienced at defensive end. Prior to the season, none of the Wildcat ends had made a tackle in a collegiate game. Junior-college transfer DeQuin Evans, sophomore Chandler Burden and redshirt freshmen Collins Ukwu and Taylor Wyndham are sharing the positions.

- Ukwu tallied his first career sack against Florida, while tying his career mark with three tackles.

- Against Louisville, Evans earned his first career sacks, totaling two for a loss of 19 yards. He also charted one against Alabama and currently leads the team in sacks along with Peters with three. He currently ranks tied for sixth in the SEC in sacks.

- Redshirt freshman defensive end Taylor Wyndham has made big plays in four of UK's six games this season -- quarterbacks sacks vs. Miami and Florida, a crucial stop on a fourth-down play vs. Louisville, and he also forced a fumble against South Carolina when he stripped Gamecock quarterback Stephan Garcia of the ball in the third quarter. Because of his outstanding play, Wyndham earned his first career start at Auburn.

LINEBACKERS

- The Wildcats linebackers are paced by senior Micah Johnson, who leads the team in tackles with 38 stops. The first-team Coaches All-SEC team selection last season currently ranks fifth in the SEC in tackles per game. With 14 tackles, just one shy of a career high, vs. Auburn, Johnson now has 232 in his career.

- Senior Sam Maxwell starts at the strongside linebacker. He was a key factor in UK's win over Louisville as he intercepted Louisville quarterback Justin Burke in the fourth quarter. He also broke up Burke's final pass of the game inside the UK 5-yard line.

- Maxwell also charted an interception against South Carolina. He currently is tied for fifth in interceptions in the SEC and tied for fourth in passes defended. Maxwell has at least one pass breakup in five of six games this season.

- Maxwell is UK's fifth-leading tackler with 36 stops, including 2.5 for loss. He charted a career-high 10 tackles vs. Auburn.

- Sophomore Danny Trevathan saw his first extensive action at weakside linebacker in the season opener. Despite a cast on his right hand due to a wrist injury, Trevathan is UK's third-leading tackler with 39 tackles. He charted a then-career-high 10 stops vs. No. 3 Alabama and grabbed a career-best 14 tackles at Auburn.

SECONDARY

- Senior cornerback Trevard Lindley leads the defensive backfield. A second-team All-American a year ago, Lindley chose to return to UK despite being projected as a second-round pick in the National Football League draft. For more on Lindley's career at UK, see the paragraph on the previous page.

- Lindley did not see action vs. South Carolina or Auburn due to an ankle injury sustained during the Alabama game on Oct. 3.

- Junior Paul Warford and sophomore Randall Burden are sharing a starting job at cornerback and the "nickelback" duties when an extra DB is needed. Warford, who missed the Alabama and South Carolina games with injury, returned to action at Auburn. He totaled six tackles and a career-high tying three pass breakups in the game.

- Freshman defensive back Martavius Neloms earned his first career start vs. South Carolina due to an injury to senior Trevard Lindley.

- Kentucky is fortunate to have great depth at safety with six returning lettermen, including seniors Ashton Cobb and Calvin Harrison, and sophomores Winston Guy, Matt Lentz, Taiedo Smith and Greg Wilson.

- Harrison, UK's fourth-leading tackler, led the team in tackles against Florida with a career-high 11 stops. It was his second career game in double figures. He previously posted 10 tackles at Vanderbilt in 2007. He has 113 career tackles.

- Harrison ranks tied for fifth in the SEC in interceptions with two. He picked off a pass in the Miami and again Saturday vs. Auburn.

- Guy led the team in the opener with seven tackles, including a quarterback sack on a blitz. He also recorded his first double-figure game in his career with 11 tackles vs. Louisville. He currently ranks second on the team and is tied for 14th in the SEC in tackles per game with 6.7.

SPECIAL TEAMS

- Senior Lones Seiber is UK's all-time leading scorer with 265 career points. The old career scoring record was 246 by Joey Worley.

- Sophomore Ryan Tydlacka inherits full-time punting duties from departed All-SEC punter Tim Masthay. He is averaging 39.1 yards per punt, a mark that ranks 10th in the SEC. He saw brief action last year at field goal duties, making

3-of-6 field goals, including a 51-yarder.

- The departed Masthay could be the most missed player on the team. In addition to leading the SEC with a 45.2-yard punting average, his booming kickoffs helped Kentucky lead the SEC in net kickoff coverage.
- Redshirt freshman kicker Craig McIntosh made his Wildcat debut against Alabama with four kickoffs averaging 63.2 yards per kick. He has two touchbacks this season.
- Matt Roark has used his 6-6 height advantage to be a force on special teams. Roark deflected three kicks last season, one field goal and two extra points, including the game-deciding blocked extra point in UK's 14-13 win over Mississippi State.

UK RANKS 19TH NATIONALLY IN KICKOFF RETURNS; LOCKE REJOINS CENTURY CLUB

With three experienced kickoff returners, it's no wonder that UK currently ranks 19th in the nation in kickoff returns with a 25.3 average.

Derrick Locke leads the charge by leading the SEC and ranking sixth nationally in kickoff returns with a 32.1 average.

Locke had a 100-yard touchdown return vs. Louisville and became the first player in school history to have two 100-yarders in a career, a feat he first did last season vs. Western Kentucky.

Locke also broke the UK record for most kickoff return yards in a game with four returns for 191 yards against the Cardinals. He was named SEC Special Teams Player of the Week for that performance.

Joining Locke on kickoff returns are Alfonso Smith, with a 22.8-yard average, Randall Cobb with 21.8 yards per return and Winston Guy, with a 21-yard average.

SPECIAL TEAMS ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Kentucky has had numerous special teams accomplishments under coordinator Steve Ortmyer, who has two Super Bowl championship rings while coaching special teams for the Oakland/Los Angeles Raiders.

- Special teams made a decisive game-changing play in each of UK's three-consecutive bowl wins (2006-07-08).
- UK has blocked 26 kicks in six seasons.
- UK led the SEC in net kickoff coverage in 2007 and 2008.
- UK led the SEC and ranked third in the nation in kickoff returns in 2008.
- Kentucky has had a better net punting average than the opponent for five consecutive seasons.
- In 2005, Kentucky was the only team that ranked in the nation's top five in both kickoff and punt returns.
- In 2006, Kentucky was the only team that ranked in the nation's top 10 in both kickoff and punt returns. UK led the nation in punt returns that season.
- There have been numerous individual achievements in addition to the team highlights. For a full list of special teams accomplishments under Coach Ortmyer, see page 15 of the UK Football Media Guide.

CATSCELLANEOUS

TOUGH SCHEDULE

As is customary for the Wildcats, Kentucky again plays one of the nation's toughest schedules in 2009 as six opponents played in bowl games a year ago. Three teams are ranked in the current Top 25 polls in Florida, Alabama, and South Carolina.

COACHING CHANGES

The Kentucky coaching staff had no changes in personnel from last season, although three assistants had adjustments in title or responsibility over the winter.

- Joker Phillips' title changed from offensive coordinator to head coach of the offense. He will continue to have overall responsibility for the offense and call the plays on game day. (Phillips also is Kentucky's head coach of the future when Rich Brooks retires.)
- Quarterbacks coach Randy Sanders adds the title of offensive coordinator. He will continue to work closely with Phillips in the development of the offensive system and weekly game plan.
- In being named offensive coordinator, Sanders has given up his duty of recruiting coordinator. That responsibility has been added to linebackers coach Chuck Smith.

PHILLIPS NAMED UK COACH OF THE FUTURE

Joker Phillips, currently the head coach of the offense, has been designated as UK's head coach of the future by Director of Athletics Mitch Barnhart. That announcement was made in Jan. 2008.

Phillips will take over when current head coach Rich Brooks leaves the position. Brooks, who has completed six years at Kentucky, has a contract that will take him through the 2011 season.

DID YOU KNOW?

- With Joker Phillips and Steve Brown as offensive and defensive coordinator, Kentucky is the first school in Southeastern Conference history to have African-Americans in those roles at the same time.
- The Kentucky cheerleaders did it again in January, winning an unprecedented 17th national championship – including 13 of the last 15 – at the annual Universal Cheerleaders Association competition.
- Wildcat superfan Jim Brown had an attendance streak of 412 consecutive home games, but had to miss the Alabama game on Oct. 3 because of illness. He had seen every home game since 1938, with the exception of 1944 (military service, World War II). For more on Brown, see the feature story on page 140 of the UK football media guide.
- Kentucky is one of only 10 schools that have won an NCAA men's basketball championship while also having a claim on a national championship in football.

IT'S A WILDCAT STATE

Kentucky is often referred to as a "basketball state," given the fact that UK arguably is the greatest men's basketball program in collegiate history.

However, we like to think of Kentucky as a "Wildcat state" because of the tremendous overall support for UK athletics. In 2008-09, Kentucky was one of only five schools to rank in the nation's top 25 in attendance for football, men's basketball and women's basketball.

In addition, Kentucky has ranked in the nation's top 35 in football attendance every year since Commonwealth Stadium was expanded in 1999. On game day, Commonwealth Stadium usually becomes the third-largest city in Kentucky.

And, over the years, one would be hard-pressed to find a school with the ups-and-downs of Kentucky football, yet has the solid bedrock of support enjoyed by the Wildcat gridders. For example, contrast Kentucky with other institutions from so-called "basketball states." Kentucky, North Carolina, Kansas, Duke, and Indiana rank 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, and 10th (respectively) in all-time college basketball victories. Here is the average attendance for those schools in the 2008 football season:

- Kentucky has had a first-team Academic All-American each of the last four years. UK and Penn State are the only two tams that accomplished that feat from 2005-08.
- Kentucky led the nation in Academic All-Americans in 2005 and 2007.
- Every senior on UK's three-consecutive bowl championship teams has graduated or signed an NFL contract with the goal of coming back to finish his degree.
- Hayden Lane and Jacob Tamme won the 2006 and 2007 SEC Scholar-Athlete of the Year Award, respectively, the first league school to have back-to-back winners.
- Four current Wildcats already have graduated -- TE Ross Bogue, OT Zipp Duncan, CB Trevard Lindley and LB Mikhail Mabry. The four players are working on their master's degrees or adding a second undergraduate major.

FAMILY TIES AT KENTUCKY

- DT Shane McCord and LB Sam Maxwell are cousins.
- CB Paul Warford and OG Larry Warford are cousins.
- Christian and Micah Johnson are brothers.

Kentucky shined on both sides of the ball in the season opener against Miami (Ohio) as the defense secured its first shutout in 13 years at a neutral-site game in Cincinnati's Paul Brown Stadium with 41,037 in the stands.

The game marked UK's largest margin of victory in a lidlifter in 25 years and also improved its non-conference winning streak to 15 consecutive games.

After the teams battled through a scoreless first quarter, UK dominated the rest of the game. Early in the second quarter, safety Calvin Harrison intercepted Miami quarterback Daniel Raudabaugh and returned the ball 42 yards to the Miami 47. That set up a four-play Wildcat scoring drive that culminated in a 27-yard touchdown pass from

quarterback Mike Hartline to wide receiver Randall Cobb down the left sideline to give UK a 7-0 lead. After the Kentucky defense forced the RedHawks into a three-and-out possession, the Wildcats started another scoring drive from their 42. Tailback Derrick Locke starred on the seven-play drive, gaining two first downs before capping it off with a 16-yard touchdown from the Wildcat formation to push the score to 14-0.

With less than five minutes to play in the half, Hartline directed another UK touchdown drive. This time wide receiver Chris Matthews took the spotlight, hauling in a 22-yard pass from Hartline for a first down just shy of Miami's red zone. On the next play, the pair teamed up again for a 21-yard score. Matthews' first touchdown of his career as Kentucky gave the Cats a 21-0 advantage going into the locker rooms.

UK's offensive explosion continued in the second half. On the first drive of the third quarter, Hartline connected with Cobb for 34 yards to the Miami 37. Cobb later scored on an 11-yard scramble on a direct snap in the Wildcat formation, giving UK a four-touchdown lead. Midway through the third, cornerback Trevard Lindley picked off Raudabaugh deep in Miami territory, taking the ball 25 yards to the house and increasing the score to 35-0. Tailback Moncell Allen rushed for the Cats' final score of the game to open the fourth stanza – a 9-yard plunge into the end zone yielding the final score.

UK had 488 yards total offense, going over 200 in both rushing and receiving for the first time in two years. Meanwhile, the UK defense limited the RedHawks to 10 first downs and 188 total yards. Lindley, who added three pass breakups to his interception TD, was named Southeastern Conference Defensive Player of the Week.



KENTUCKY 31, LOUISVILLE 27

Kentucky forced two Louisville turnovers late in the game during its fourth-quarter comeback 31-27 victory in the Governor's Cup series, marking the Wildcats' third-straight win against the Cardinals in front of 70,988 fans at Commonwealth Stadium – the fourth-largest crowd in UK history.

With just under six minutes remaining in the game and Louisville leading 27-24, UK's A.J. Nance recovered a fumble on a muffed punt return at the UofL 24-yard line. Nance's recovery set up the game-winning score when wide receiver Randall Cobb made a leaping 12-yard touchdown catch from quarterback Mike Hartline to give the Cats their final margin of victory.

Kentucky linebacker Sam Maxwell made two huge defensive plays down the stretch to secure the win. Just inside two minutes remaining, defensive tackle Corey Peters tipped a pass that Maxwell intercepted and returned 17 yards. Later Maxwell ended the game when he broke up a final pass attempt by Burke inside the UK 5-yard line.

UK opened the scoring in the first quarter with a 26-yard field goal from Lones Seiber. The Cardinals bounced back with a 6-yard touchdown run by Victor Anderson. On the ensuing kickoff, Derrick Locke returned the ball 100 yards for a Kentucky touchdown and a 10-7 lead. Locke became the first player in UK history to return two kickoffs for 100-yard touchdowns in a career and he set a single-game school record with 191 return yards.

Fullback John Conner's two-yard TD scamper gave UK a 17-7 lead at the half. After halftime, miscues plagued the Wildcats. UK only possessed the ball for four plays in the third quarter as three turnovers led to a pair of Louisville field goals and a touchdown pass from Justin Burke to Cameron Graham, giving the visitors a 20-17 lead.

Later in the fourth, Locke capped a 12-play, 73-yard drive with a two-yard touchdown plunge to give UK a 24-20 advantage. Louisville struck back quickly two plays later with a 66-yard touchdown pass from Burke to Trent Guy to put the Cardinals up 27-24, two minutes before Nance made his game-changing fumble recovery.

The win marked UK's 16th consecutive non-conference victory and was the 10th time in the last 34 games that the Wildcats came from behind in the fourth quarter to win the game.



Top-ranked Florida lived up to its billing by scoring on the team's first five possessions of the game to jump out to a commanding lead and top Kentucky 41-7 in the Wildcats' Southeastern Conference opener in front of 71,011 fans at Commonwealth Stadium – the fourth-largest crowd in UK history.

The Gators scored a 22-yard field goal by Caleb Sturgis on its opening drive to go up early. UF quarterback Tim Tebow scored the first touchdown of the game on a three-yard rush a few minutes later. On the ensuing possession, Florida's Chris Rainey blocked a UK punt attempt and recovered it in the endzone to give the Gators a 17-0 advantage. Late in the first quarter, Tebow rushed for his second touchdown of the game, dashing two yards for the score. The former Heisman Trophy winner ended the quarter with 44-yard touchdown pass to tight end Aaron Hernandez to increase the Gators' lead.

Kentucky got on the board late in the second quarter with a 58-yard, 14-play drive. On fourth-and-goal from the two-yard line, quarterback Mike Hartline connected with tight end Ross Bogue for a two-yard touchdown. It the first touchdown of Bogue's career as the Wildcats cut the lead to 31-7 going into the locker rooms. The extra point by Lones Seiber gave him 246 points as a Wildcat, tying the UK career scoring record held by Joey Worley.

The Gators finished the scoring in the second half when Sturgis booted his second field goal of the game, connecting from 33 yards, and wide receiver Riley Cooper caught an eight-yard touchdown pass from John Brantley for the final margin. On defense, Kentucky's Calvin Harrison led the teams in tackles with a career-high 11 stops, his second game all-time in double figures. UK linebacker Micah Johnson surpassed the 200-mark for career tackles with nine for the game to total 205 career stops.



Two touchdowns in the final minute of the first half gave third-ranked Alabama a 15-point lead and propelled the Crimson Tide to a 38-20 victory in front of 70,967 onlookers, the seventh-largest crowd in Commonwealth Stadium history.

Alabama's offense got out of the gate quickly on a three-play, 37-yard drive that ended with an 11-yard touchdown run by Mark Ingram. Kentucky responded midway through the first quarter when Lones Seiber booted a career-long 49-yard field goal that gave him the UK career scoring record. Seiber later cut the Alabama lead to one after connecting on another 49-yard field goal to end the quarter.

Late in the second quarter, the Crimson Tide offense drove 97 yards on 13 plays to score on a three-yard Greg McElroy pass to Colin Peek with 40 seconds remaining. Seconds later the Alabama defense recovered a UK fumble and Courtney Upshaw returned it 45 yards for a touchdown to increase the UA lead to 21-6 at the half.

The Crimson Tide defenders continued to apply pressure in the third quarter, forcing two Wildcat turnovers. As a result, Ingram scored his second touchdown of the game on a 32-yard run and the Tide added a 36-yard field goal from Leigh Tiffin to extend their lead early in the half. UK responded when Randall Cobb hauled in a career-long reception of 45 yards from Mike Hartline for a touchdown. McElroy closed the scoring in the third quarter with a seven-yard touchdown toss to Darius Hanks. In the final stanza, Kentucky scored on a 16-play, 65-yard touchdown drive that ended on a two-yard scamper into the endzone by Alfonso Smith, his first rushing score of the season.

In the game, UK tailback Derrick Locke became the 31st player in school history to reach 1,000 rushing yards in his career after gaining a season-high 75 yards on 20 carries against the Tide. Locke added a season-high 63 yards receiving and 66 yards on kickoff returns to gain 204 all-purpose yards and maintain his position atop the SEC. On defense, linebacker Danny Trevathan doubled his previous career high for tackles in a game, taking down 10 Alabama ballcarriers. Micah Johnson also posted 10 stops from his linebacker slot.



Kentucky scored a touchdown on its final possession but a Wildcat two-point conversion to tie the game failed and South Carolina ran out the final 4:34 to secure a 28-26 victory in a see-saw battle at Williams-Brice Stadium in Columbia.

UK opened the scoring with a 36-yard field goal from Lones Seiber with four minutes remaining in the first quarter. South Carolina returned the kickoff 61 yards, leading to a 10-yard touchdown reception for Alshon Jeffery from Stephen Garcia a few plays later to overtake the Cats at 7-3.

The Wildcats regained the lead at 10-7 when Derrick Locke scored on an 11-yard run on the second play of the second quarter. Jeffery scored a second touchdown on a 28-yard throw from Garcia during the Gamecocks' next possession to take a 14-10. UK's Randall Cobb hauled in a career-long 55-yard reception from Mike Hartline to set up a scoring drive that ended a few plays later with Hartline throwing a seven-yard touchdown strike to Cobb. The Wildcats stopped USC on its final two drives of the half to maintain a 17-14 lead at the half.

Hartline was forced to leave the game with a knee injury on the third play of the second half and was replaced by Will Fidler. Jeffery and Garcia connected on their third score of the game on a 22-yard touchdown through the air midway through the third quarter to give USC a 21-17 lead. The Wildcats cut the lead to one after a 35-yard field goal from Seiber.

Midway through the fourth, the Gamecocks increased their lead to 28-20 after a two-yard touchdown plunge by Garcia. The Wildcats responded with an 8-play, 70-yard drive that ended with a two-yard touchdown run by Cobb to cut the lead to two before the failed two-point conversion attempt.

Cobb led the offense with 229 all-purpose yards and two scores on the day. Locke carried the ball a career-high 24 times for 89 yards and a touchdown. He now ranks 25th on the all-time UK rushing list with 1,157 career yards. Senior tackle Corey Peters led the Wildcat defense, posting seven tackles and a career-high 2.5 sacks. Linebacker Sam Maxwell also made seven stops and an interception against the Gamecocks.



Kentucky earned its first victory over Auburn in 43 years, aided by a defensive second-half shutout and two touchdowns in the final seven minutes, during a 21-14 come-from-behind victory in front of 86,217 at the Tigers' Jordan-Hare Stadium.

Auburn got on the scoreboard first when Jake Ricks blocked a 38-yard UK field goal attempt. The ball was picked up by AU's Neiko Thorpe and returned for a touchdown to give the Tigers a 7-0 lead in the first quarter.

Kentucky scored on its first possession of the second quarter with true freshman Morgan Newton under center for his first career start in place of the injured Mike Hartline. Newton scored his first career rushing touchdown with a 4-yard scamper into the endzone. The Tigers broke the 7-7 tie just before the half when Ben Tate ran up the middle for a score on a fourth-and-one play at the UK 1-yard line.

After a scoreless third quarter, UK began the fourth quarter by charting the longest touchdown drive of the game to tie the score at 14. Now with Will Fidler at quarterback, the Wildcats drove 75 yards in 12 plays, capped by Fidler's 2-yard plunge for the score. Following a three-and-out series by the Kentucky defense, the Wildcats scored again. A 61-yard run by Randall Cobb moved the ball to the Auburn 3-yard line. Cobb rushed around the left end three plays later for a 4-yard touchdown to provide the winning score.

The UK offense totaled a season-high 282 rushing yards – the most against an SEC opponent in 14 years. The Wildcats produced two 100-yard rushers in the game as Locke gained 126 yards and Cobb rushed for 109 markers, both career-high rushing totals. Each of the three quarterbacks – Newton, Fidler and Cobb - ran for one UK touchdown in the victory.

Wildcat defenders held Auburn below 21 points for the first time in seven games this season and limited AU to a season-low 315 yards on offense. Danny Trevathan and Sam Maxwell achieved career highs in tackles with 14 and 10, respectively. Fellow linebacker Micah Johnson charted a season-high 14 stops, his third double-digit tackling effort of the year. Defensive back Calvin Harrison notched his third career interception in the first quarter. After missing the previous two games because of injury, cornerback Paul Warford returned to tie a career high with three break-ups.
